



- Funding coming from outside the US 75%





New int'l student enrollments:


Declines: 45%

5 institutions report slight increases






INTERNATIONAL

Major Sending and Islamic Countries

- Declines in enrollments in many major sending countries with large Islamic populations, especially United Arab Emirates, Saudi Arabia, and Pakistan
- More campuses report increases for India, Korea, Kenya.
- Reasons for declines/delays, combination of:
 - Visa Application Process
 - Financial Difficulties
 - Attraction to other host countries
